

GORDON RUSSELL DESIGN MUSEUM

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RUSSIAN SUPREMATIST STYLE IN THE COTSWOLDS

Local councillors and members of the Broadway Trust joined auctioneers, dealers, museum officials, furniture makers and blacksmiths at the private view of the Gordon Russell Design Museum metalwork exhibition on Friday 14 September 2012. Hugh Williams' Russian suprematist style display perfectly set off the work of three recent blacksmith graduates from the Hereford College of Art. The development of their design ideas could be seen in the sketchbooks and working drawings which accompanied their finished pieces. In his opening speech Master Blacksmith David Gregory, whose commissions include the refurbishment of the



railings for the Georgian Group headquarters building in Fitzroy Square, and the hinges and handles for Dover Castle, encouraged the young blacksmiths to persevere in making their work stand out, as there would always be a place for distinctive bespoke work he told them. An anodised aluminium staircase treatment by the avant garde designer Fred Baier complemented the students' work.



In contrast the show also includes several loan items of early Gordon Russell metalwork in the Arts & Crafts style. The Museum's Curator, Jennifer Piepereit, displayed albums of archival photographs to demonstrate the large range of Gordon Russell's designs.

To conclude the evening a group retired for dinner at Russells, the restaurant which now occupies the old headquarters of Gordon Russell's company. This selling exhibition is on until 16th November 2012.
