

alternative to the authoritarian regimes typical of the late Victorian public schools. In 1898 the school became fully co-educational and in 1916 the children were given a formal voice when the school council was formed. We will tour the whole school but the focus of our

visit will be upon firstly, the Memorial Library designed by Ernest Gimson (and thus we will see and hear an echo of the earlier talk given by Mary Greensted) to commemorate the Great War and secondly, the Lupton Hall (originally the Assembly Hall) built in 1911 as a venue for plays, concerts and singing.

uniquely appointed "Official War Poster Artist". Postwar, he created posters for London Transport, Guinness, the Financial Times and the British Overseas Airways Corporation. He designed the first animated ident for BBC television, the covers of Penguin Books and the emblems for the 1951 Festival of Britain and the Queen's Award to Industry. Games also created postage stamps issued in Britain, Jersey and Israel. The length of Game's career makes his work a striking record of the social history of 20th century Britain. Naomi will talk about her father's personal philosophy of 'maximum meaning, minimum means'. "Over the past 20 years I have observed both the demise of graduate level craft programmes in the UK and the significant reduction in children learning craft in schools. At the same time the furniture industry

Set against this backdrop my fellowship took me to northern Europe and the east coast of America to learn first hand from programmes and institutions that deliver excellence in furniture education. Joseph has been directly involved with the furniture industry for over 20 years, initially as a bespoke furniture designer and then as an educator at Rycotewood where he was the course leader of the BA (Hons) Furniture Design and Make programme. In 2018 he joined the Sylva Foundation to develop a new role as Head of Wood School with the intention of making craft education available to as broad a range of people as possible.

awarded to the outstanding City and Guilds student at Mid-Warwickshire College, Leamington Spa.





At the time of the Queen's Silver Jubilee in 1977 Ron was still employed by Gordon Russell and he was presented [perhaps to commemorate his long service?] with a mirror made to mark the

at work is on display in the Museum.

On the 14th June Geoffrey and Frances Stride visited the Museum. They saw the picture of Ron Pepper and so admired the mirror that they bought it on the spot. They told us that they were the proud owners of two other pieces of Gordon Russell furniture and sent photographs and the story behind each piece.



The other piece is a small hall table which was bought at auction in Paris some 30 years ago. Martin Blakeman undertook some research and was able to tell Geoffrey Stride that the broad arrow stamp on the frame indicates that the table was purchased by the Ministry of Works, and was intended for use in officer quarters in the Army or RAF. The table was probably designed by WH (Curly) Russell who, no relation to the Russell family, was appointed chief designer to the company in the 1930's. It is just possible to make out the date '1960' which would have been when the table was manufactured. The other identifiable mark is 'AC' which refers to a type of lacquer which was introduced in the early 1960's.











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
